As does the clock on the bomb attached to the prime ministers neck.



Years earlier, Robert Vågland is living in a high rise in the same neighborhood with his little sister and their sick, absent mother. Longing for his missing father, who, according to his mother, died in a shipwreck, he decides to follow in his father's footsteps as a navigator and cartographer.

In our time, Lisbeth's ex-husband Henrik also starts receiving mysterious maps, while his son Mikkel also starts receiving texts from his dead mother.

Detective John Persvik struggles to find a motive or the perpetrator, but when a local alcoholic who might have witnessed something the night of the murder comes forward, more possibilities come to light.



He was awarded the Riverton Award in both 2000 and 2015, and he won the Norwegian Book Award (the Brage Prize) for the novel *The Courier* in 2015.


The History of Bees (2016) established Maja Lunde as a major name on the world literary stage, as well as a leading advocate for the climate cause. Alongside *The End of the Ocean* (Blå) and *The Last Wild Horses* (Przewalskis hest), it has engaged readers all over the world. This September the fourth and final volume will connect the threads from all the previous books for an epic finale.

The Dream of a Tree is set in Spitsbergen at Svalbard in 2110, after a global collapse. Five children are all alone, one of them guarding the access to a frozen seed vault, containing thousands of seeds from all over the world.

The final installment of Maja Lunde's Climate Quartet asks important questions about responsibility and sustainability, and human's place in nature. It is also a chilling and gripping tale on our responsibility, both as a species and as individuals.

### Maja Lunde

Maja Lunde (b. 1975) is the most successful Norwegian author of her generation. Her books are translated into 40 languages and has sold more than 4 million copies. Lunde's debut novel *The History of Bees* (2015) was an instant hit and sold in several territories before the Norwegian publication. It won The Norwegian Bookseller's Prize as well as multiple international awards, and was the best selling book of any genre in Germany in 2017 and spent 3 consecutive years on the Der Spiegel official German bestseller list. The sequel *Blue* was launched in the fall 2017, as part of the author's planned Climate Quartet. Book 3 *Przewalskis Horse* was published in the fall of 2019, both to equal acclaim.

Schizothemia is written in an attempt to understand the author Thure Erik Lund, and thereby also understand the art of the novel. For almost forty years, Hans Petter Blad has studied his best friend, and quietly defended him against both real and imagined attacks on his works. The studies are an attempt to approach one of the most unfathomable figures of Norwegian literature, something that can only be achieved by placing him in a fictional text, since Lund, according to Blad, is the incarnation of writing itself.

Schizothemia is a novel about a living author, written in the belief that by drawing a portrait of a rare intellectual, it would be possible to understand one's own vulnerability and place in what Lund calls 'teksstrømmen' – the stream of text. That is, a word that cannot be translated anywhere other than in the literary novel, but a word that can relate to the world as a whole, as well as everything the world is not.

The preparations for the moment she'll become what she really is take two years. Two years in cold and darkness. Two years in tediousness and mortal danger. When she finally – exhausted and full of minutes – settles on the water and releases her fertilised eggs towards the lake's muddy floor, she has lived her life to the full.

Her wings, which have pointed skywards like shining sails, flatten and cling to the surface of the small mountain lake, and so, at the moment of death, she forms a small cross in fleeting memoriam of herself. Microscopic eggs, so light that they hardly sink on their way down through the amber darkness, are picked off one by one by small fish and crustaceans. But not all. Some of them reach the silt far below. Over time these eggs burst, and out crawls a tiny nymph. Blind and disoriented, it fumbles around in its dim, oxygen-starved underworld. The nymph digs deeper to evade predatory insects. In relative safety, it lives off the rotting remains of vegetation in which it lies. And it grows, and its skin cracks, and it crawls out of itself and forms a new skin, and repeats this process, time and again. And each time it becomes bigger, stronger. Because in this simple insect lives an ambition.

This cannot be all there is. Life must be somewhere else. My time must surely come.

Something tugs at the nymph. It longs to move up and out, to be refined, to make it out of mud and slime, up towards the light – where the flying ones are.

And then the miracle happens. A tiny change in the water's temperature is all it takes for the nymphs to leave their night-dark childhood home and flounder their way up towards the day. They are by now a solid mouthful for the hungry hunters that lie in wait in their allotted places in the food chain, and only a few of the nymphs will reach the surface.

Dazzled by the sunlight, the nymph lies in the water and understands that this change is different from all its other, earlier sloughings. Is this the final one? The insect's back cracks, and something squeezes up through the rift. It's wings! Damp and wrinkled, to be sure, but wings all the same.

Stuck legs; must try to coax them loose, one at a time. The old skin is thick and unwieldy, and this is taking too long. What are those huge, green shadows down below? The lake is full of fellow mayflies in the same situation. They are there, and then suddenly, they are not. Some rise into the air and mysteriously disappear. Others struggle to emerge from their capsules.

The fully grown mayfly jerks out its last obstinate leg and is free. His wings lift him up from the lake, and real life begins. Forgotten are the endless days, weeks, months in the sadness of the mud. He flies for the first time, an unsteady route in the direction of the reeds that line the bank. His faceted eyes are filled with light and colour. This was what he knew, deep inside.

Life is somewhere else. Life is here, life is NOW.



In Jewish tradition, they say that a person dies twice. The first death comes when the heart stops beating, the second when the name of the dead is uttered for the last time.

A woman stands before a family grave on All Saints' Day. She is the only descendant of her father's family of seven brothers and sisters, and only she can keep the memory of the dead alive, at least for a short while longer.

The Second Death takes place in an era in which two world wars, a labour shortage and an economic crisis shaped people's living conditions. Anchoring her story in documents left behind by the dead, as well as their photo albums and memories, Kjersti Ericsson conjures up nine lives: the lives of her own grandparents, as well as of each of their seven children. It is a story of tuberculosis and early death, about hubris and decline, and about pain handed down from one generation to the next. At its heart, this is also a story about memory and forgetting, about grief of all that will eventually disappear, and about the dream of giving ordinary lives the permanence of eternity.

### Kjersti Ericsson

Kjersti Ericsson (b. 1944) made her debut in 1968 with a collection of poetry. Since then she has published a number of novels and poetry collections. Ericsson has also published several non-fiction books on both WW2 and other topics. In 2009 she was awarded the Unified Language Literary Prize.



In *Downhill*, we follow the almost adult Nils through the first few years of the 1960s in his hometown of Oslo. Nils and his best friend Zakk share a passion for literature, politics and girls. Through their shared interest in films, they become acquainted with Nora and Ester. Nils recognises his own darkness in Nora, but there's something inscrutable about her too, something that has him head over heels in love, and fills him with an urge to protect her. At the same time, the superpowers of the world are playing out their nuclear brinkmanship, and the danger of annihilation feels imminent.

The young people read, have discussions and participate in meetings at the Socialist Student Union, but does any of it really help when the world seems to have become unhinged?

Downhill is a novel about friendship, political awakening and young love, about anxiety and feeling like an outsider, and about finding your own voice in a world that has succumbed to the political madness of the great political powers of the time.

### Espen Haavardsholm

Espen Haavardsholm (b. 1945) made his debut with the short story collection *Tide* (1966) and had his breakthrough with the prose collection *Z*ink (1971). Haavardsholm's works range from the minimalist to the epic, from short prose, stories and novels to essays and biographies. *The Boy in the Passport Photo* (2004) was hailed as a highpoint of his oeuvre, and was the first of a series of stand-alone novels that mix fiction and autobiography in inventive ways.



In 2016 her novel *Bungalow* was met with brilliant reviews. Later that year she received the Swedish Academy's Dobloug Prize.



Criminal and Punishment opens with the words 'I have decided to write about him'. The writer is Norwegian, but she has been living in Paris for the past ten years. 'Him' being the man who raped her. Nobody, neither her family nor her boyfriend, wants her to write about him – she doesn't even want to do it herself.

While she waits for her case to come before the court, she and her boyfriend look for a place together, in a city that feels stranger to her than ever before. She reads all she can about crime scenes, criminals and the crimes themselves. And she writes. It feels like a punishment, that she has been sentenced to do this. He has become the main character in her life.

Through direct, searching prose, *Criminal and Punishment* describes the period following on from a rape, in an open, confronting and thoughtful way. It is also a literary polemic, in which Nedrejord harshly criticises our narratives of victim and offender, guilt and punishment.

### Kathrine Nedrejord

Kathrine Nedrejord (b.1987) is a writer and a playwright. She made her debut in 2010 with the novel *Transit*, which received glowing reviews. In 2019 her acclaimed novel *Transformation* was awarded the Havmann Prize. Her books for children and young adults have earned her several award nominations. In 2018, Nedrejord was made the house dramatist at the National Theatre in Oslo. She lives in Paris.



Maria Navarro Skaranger was born in 1994 in Oslo and made her debut in 2015 with the novel All the Foreigners Have Their Curtains Closed, which was sold to Denmark even before publication and was nominated for the Vesaas First Book Award. The book was made into a film which premiered in the early spring of 2020. Her second novel, Book of Grief (The Story of Nils in the Woods) won the Oslo Prize in 2018 and the EU Literature Prize in 2020.

Bruno W is a chef who has just received his first Michelin star. His days are spent shuttling between his bed, the food markets, the best food shops in the city, and his restaurant in Milan. His fiancée complains about the fact that she hardly ever sees him. His strive to find that perfect flavour overshadows everything else in his life.

Ten days before their wedding, Bruno jumps on a train to Piombino, and then catches a boat to Elba, for some time off. On Elba, he ends up with a widow on a beautiful, mysterious property. The widow's hair looks like cotton candy. Talking to her is like talking to God.

Three years later, he returns to Elba. He keeps the terrible incident that has happened to him a secret, and tries to transform the secret into gold.

The Man from Milan is an elegant and somewhat fantastical novel about a chef on the run and a widow on a horse, about his speed and her idleness, about an island of tantalising plants and a taste that no longer exists.

Marit Tusvik (b 1951) made her debut in 1979 with a collection of poetry and prose. She has since written numerous novels, collections of poetry, plays and children's books. Her first novel, *The Ice House* (1991), won her the New Norwegian Prize for Literature and Mads Wiel Nygaard's Endowment. She has also won the Amalie Skram Prize and, in 2004, the prestigious Dobloug Prize.

# The Pandemic Archives



The coronavirus crisis is a powerful reminder of the fact that the body is much more than a vessel for our free an independent self-development. The body is a part of nature, vulnerable because it is connected to all other forms of life – even a virus from a bat.

Even if the present pandemic creates a situation that is fundamentally new to all of us, it isn't new in human history. In stories of plague and pandemics we are met with descriptions of the tribulations that face both societies and individuals: How do we stop the disease from spreading? How do we take care of our duties to our fellow humans? How do we care for the sick, bury the dead and at the same time avoid infection? In short: How do we survive?

In *The Pandemic Archives*, Stueland explores literary representations of how everyday life is redefined by quarantine rules, fear, heartbreaking goodbyes, and self-sacrificing relief work. He also examines the medical aspects, using literature as a guide to understand medical and political responses to biological events.

### Espen Stueland

Espen Stueland made his literary debut in 1992 and has written four poetry collections, a novel, and a prose collection, as well as breath-taking, ambitious literary non-fiction books on law, climate change and dissection. He has received several awards for his poetry, was named one of Norway's 10 best authors under 35 by Morgenbladet in 2004 and has been voted Critic of the Year.
