Love, on the other hand, is a literary icon, known for his existential, brooding masterpieces. Romance? That's for dreamers.

After an epic karaoke embarrasment at the Gothenburg Book Fair goes viral, Karo finds herself at the center of a publicity stunt: Love's renonwed publisher wants to pair her and Love to co-write a novel. The goal? Blending their worlds for a guaranteed international bestseller.

The year is 1814, and Aslak Broch has just turned eighteen when representatives from the army come to the farm and demand that he report for duty. His parents oppose their son's desire to go. They have sacrificed too much to let him die fighting for a Danish king.

Aslak has been waiting for such an opportunity all his life. He defies his parents, and for the first time he gets to know boys his own age. At home on the farm, his parents have to deal with the fear that their son will die.


A Girl Child is the story of the brotherhood between three young men at war, and two parents who are left alone with the guilt of the sin they committed to keep their son alive.



Tragedy under Drifting Clouds



But at the boarding house, with its secret doors and its silent, shadowy figures, she is subjected to disturbances and terrifying threats. She finds herself in a dreamlike landscape of rugged cliffs, dark winter surf and deep caves. And when a young boy is found dead outside the limestone quarry, she is drawn into a series of mysterious events that unfold in the desolate place.

Tragedy Under Drifting Clouds is a mystery novel of classic proportions, breathtakingly exciting, both uplifting and mournful, written in a rich and dense language, as only Rune Christiansen can do.




Rune Christiansen (b. 1963) became an important figure in the Norwegian literary landscape already with the publication of his poetry debut in 1986. Initially known as a groundbreaking poet, Christiansen has since 2003 published a string of accclaimed novels. *The Loneliness in Lydia Erneman's Life* (2014) won the Brage Prize and was shortlisted for three major awards including the Critics' Prize. In 2017 *Fanny and the Mystery in the Grieving Forest* was nominated for the Brage Prize. His 2021 novel *The Case of the Caprice of Lost Time* won the French Transfuge Prize in 2023.


On the cribs in the maternity wards until well into the 1970s, a V for 'viv' (wife) was written if the mother was a married woman. If the mother was unmarried, an S for 'Spuria' was written, a latin word meaning false or illegitimate. Mother and child were marked from the very beginning.

Mjønes has published a number of novels, young adult novels, and children's books. In 2018, he received the Mads Wiel Nygaard's Endowment for his acclaimed novel Home.



She has always been able to rely on her childhood fantasies to help her cope, but now they change form and become more unpredictable. They no longer lead her away from, but straight into the pain, and things start to crack.

Margaret, Are You Grieving is an honest and fearless portrait of a young woman who is drawn towards life and death simultaneously.



Maria Kjos Fonn (b. 1990) was nominated for the Tarjei Vesaas' Debut Prize and received Aschehoug's debutant scholarship for her short story collection *I've Never Told This to Anyone* in 2014. Her first novel *Kinderwhore* (2019) received excellent reviews, has been translated into several languages, and was nominated for the Brage Prize and the P2 Listeners' Novel Prize. In 2020, her acclaimed second novel *Heroin Chic* was also nominated for the P2 Listeners' Novel Prize and Natt & Dag's Oslo Prize.



Jenny Hval

Stage Human



In *Stage Person*, Jenny Hval writes based on her own life on stage for more than 25 years. Hval freely and inventively balances between essay and memoir, experience and thought in a book about life and art, about listener and performer, about underground, art, pop music, and politics.

In an often surprising and original way, Hval draws lines from concrete experiences with stage and compositional work to events from her own life that have influenced artistic choices and the kind of character she has been able to portray on stage. Where is the line between the private and the stage body? What does it do to the art that the artist is so clearly treated as a commodity? And who is the person on stage when that person is a "pop artist", someone who does not play a dramatic role but is always confronted with and identified through their own body, their own name, their gender, and their own visibility?



Jenny Hval (b. 1980) is a writer, musician and sound artist. She made her literary debut with the novel *Paradise Rot* in 2009, and followed up with the essay book *Sings with Her Eyes* in 2012, and then the novel *Girls against God* in 2018. Her books have been translated into 9 languages. Hval has released numerous acclaimed albums, including Apocalypse Girl (2015), Blood Bitch (2016) and The Practice of Love (2019).

After her husband is struck by serious illness, Olin travels home, as always, to seek advice from her parents. The result is a film, Songs of the Earth. But right after the first screening of the film with her parents attendant, her mother falls ill, dying shortly after.

In Song for Mother, Olin writes a warm portrait of her mother. It is a life-affirming book of grief and love and a gorgeous tribute to a mother and the dramatic West-Norwegian landscape that the author grew up in and that her family's life has been deeply connected with.






Through five decades, Dag Solstad (b. 1941) has produced works of the highest literary quality that somehow have both interpreted and defined the changing moods of the times. 
The London police believe they have incriminating evidence. Johan needs help from the outside, and his childhood friend, the Norwegian police investigator Harinder Singh, is called in.

"I begin on a Sunday evening in August 1963. I was left alone in a room at Langmyrvegen 16 in Molde after my mother and father, who had accompanied me there, had said goodbye and returned home with the local taxi. Now my real life was about to begin. I was going to become a person in the modern world, in my time, not one of many in the long line of farmers from whom I descended, in a landscape where time stood still. That's how I thought about it. I didn't understand that I was still a child."

Young Man Wants to Break Out is a memoir novel that closely examines a young mind and an era. In the late summer of 1963, four-teen-year-old Edvard moves to Molde. He is going to attend the secondary school, as it was called then, in the city - a small town, admittedly, but much larger than the village he moves from. He is young, and he wants out. More than sixty years later, the aging Edvard writes about him: the young man's bitter defeats, great joys, nagging doubts, and boundless ambitions.

Edvard Hoem


Edvard Hoem (born 1949) made his debut in 1969. He has since published numerous novels, and has received four nominations for the Nordic Council's Literary Prize. Hoem has also written plays, essays and biographies and has translated seven Shakespeare plays. In 2014, he published the first of a four-volume family saga on emigration to North America, which has sold more than 200,000 copies in Norway. He has also written three more hugely popular-stand-alone historical novels set in Norway in the 19th Century: *The Midwife* (2018), *The Fiddle Maker* (2020) and *The Housemaid* (2023).

Sigurd Hverven

Hegel - A Fairly Simple Book about a Difficult Philosopher


The German philosopher Georg Wilhelm Friedrich Hegel has significantly influenced our understanding of history, modernity, freedom, and progress, so much so that he undoubtedly shapes the way you think - perhaps without you even knowing it.

What happens when Hegel's ideas meet our time? That is the question when the young philosopher Sigurd Hverven takes Hegel on a tour of our contemporary world. The book shows that central Hegelian ideas - about freedom, recognition, history, alienation, and love - are still relevant for understanding pressing issues in our own time. At the same time, Hverven uses Hegel's thinking to shed light on phenomena Hegel was not familiar with, such as the welfare state, smartphones, and feminist and anti-racist liberation movements.

Hegel's texts are notorious for being difficult, bordering on the incomprehensible. But in this book, Hegel becomes understandable even for readers without extensive philosophical background. With biographical details from Hegel's life, combined with striking examples from our time, Hverven brings the abstract philosophical material to life. The book is both an accessible introduction to Hegel's philosophy and a comprehensive actualization of this German master thinker.

Sigurd Hverven

Sigurd Hverven (b. 1991) holds a PhD in philosophy from NTNU in Trondheim. He was awarded the Georg Morgenstierne Prize for outstanding achievement in the master's program in philosophy at the University of Oslo. He works full-time as a freelance writer, lecturer, and independent academic. In 2024 and 2025, he received the State Artist Grant for Young Non-Fiction Writers. His latest book is the critically acclaimed *Hegel: A Fairly Simple Book About a Difficult Philosopher* (2024).



Granddad's Bunker - A Family Story





"Finally we have a book that looks at the Second World War with new eyes ... First and foremost, it is the story of the women's war that makes an impression. Soviet and Polish soldiers regarded the German civilian population as fair game. Everything of value was plundered. Women and old men were put into forced labor. And underneath it all is the sexual violence... What makes "Grandfather's Bunker" exciting is how Pabst uses the family history for something bigger. Her discussion of how such trauma is inherited is interesting."

Kathrin Pabst's ancestors were living in Pomerania when, in the winter months of 1945, the Red Army advanced and pushed millions of German civilians out of the areas that would now fall to Poland. Throughout a long year on the run, the great-grandparents kept a diary describing the cold, hunger and disease, forced labor and systematic rape. But none of this was ever talked about in the family.

At the same time, their son, Kathrin's grand-father, was a Wehrmacht soldier in one of Hitler's elite troops. He too wrote a diary, but it does not mention acts of war in which he probably participated, and he never talked about them. Later in life, he would build a house with a bunker in the basement. Why would he do that? And how could he, who was so loving, fail to distance himself from Nazism and the crimes his own regiment must have committed?

Kathrin Pabst's personal story shows how traumatic events can leave their mark on several generations, and why it is so important to talk about even the painful memories.

Kathrin Pabst was born in Gummersbach in Germany and moved to Norway in 2001. She has a PhD in ethics and has many years of experience working with difficult and tabooed stories.



Ivo de Figueiredo

Ivo de Figueiredo (b. 1966) is a historian, author and critic. After having written the award winning biography *Free Man* on the Supreme Court lawyer Johan B. Hjort, he wrote the highly praised two-volume biography of Henrik Ibsen (2006/07). This biography is today considered the most complete and well researched biography on Henrik Ibsen.

Edvard Munch is not only celebrated as Norway's preeminent artist, he has also etched a permanent mark on global culture. *The Storm* chronicles the life of this prodigious artist who, after rattling Kristiania with his revolutionary artworks, made a dynamic entrance onto the European stage, emerging as a formidable force from the north.

From the iconic "The Scream" to captivating pieces like "Madonna" and "Vampire", Munch did more than merely depict scenes; he rendered raw emotions on canvas. His life and oeuvre navigated through an era marked by monumental shifts in both global events and the artistic domain. To understand Munch's life is also to understand the tumultuous backdrop of his contemporary Europe.



100 Things I Think About When I Think About

In this book you get a hundred good reasons to think even more about the fascinating Roman Empire. For example, that the romans cheered from the stands in the Colosseum while condemned people were torn to pieces by bears captured in Scotland and lions from Africa. Or that they washed their clothes in urine. When they wanted entertainment, the Romans smoked so-called "laughter leaves" from Afghanistan. They scribbled rude things on toilet walls. And a bald emperor was so thin-skinned that he made it a criminal offense to look down on him from above.

Magnus Helgerud has thought about all this, but also about how the Romans wrote laws we still live by, performed complicated surgeries and built sewer systems still in use today. This thought work has become this year's funniest history lesson.
